My aim in making this change was



The highlight of the trip was our visit to the Omics Centre of Excellence, a state-of-the-art genetic sequencing lab envisioning a safe future for human life and seeking solutions that will benefit members of our society for generations to come.



Our students had the unique opportunity to attend a lecture at this Centre of Excellence by highcalibre professors and doctors, which we hope has nurtured our students' curiosity and inspired them to contribute towards a better world. We also visited Masdar/Sustainable City, a mixed-use, sustainable community including employment-generating land uses, residential areas. parks, plazas, and neighbourhood amenities. Students learned about the economic viability of such projects and the improved quality of life within the lowest environmental footprint. Mathematics

YEAR 7

Numbers are an important part of everyday life. The systems that we use to represent numbers have developed over time as a response to human interactions. This term the Year 7 students engaged in a comprehensive study of numbers and number systems, delving into the historical and cultural aspects of various civilisations. The students were able to independently gather information about their assigned civilisation, including its creation, historical use, and present relevance, indicating a level of autonomy. This approach not only helps students understand mathematical concepts but also fosters a broader appreciation for the cultural and historical context in which these systems developed. The emphasis was on understanding the basis of the number system, such as patterns, place value, and operations which shows a deep exploration of the mathematical concepts. The successful completion of the summative task on Criterion C, which typically focuses on the student's ability to communicate mathematically, reflects positively on their overall development as learners. Overall. students had a rich and engaging learning experience, combining mathematical knowledge with research skills, critical thinking, and effective communication. Congratulations to both the students and the teachers on a successful unit!



YEAR 8

During Term 1 in Year 8 Mathematics, students explored several important ATL (Approaches to Learning) skills. One skill they focused on was critical thinking. They were encouraged to analyse problems, evaluate different solution strategies, and justify their reasoning.



Another skill they delved into was communication. Students engaged in discussions and collaborations, thus showing their thinking and social skills which were commendable. They happily presented their Halloween coordinates to their peers to effectively express their mathematical ideas. Overall, these ATL skills helped students develop a deeper understanding of mathematical concepts and enhanced their ability to think critically and communicate mathematically.

YEAR 9

Every year during the festive season, the Faculty of Maths go beyond traditional teaching and bring joy and creativity to the community. This year we are highlighting the remarkable achievement of our Year 9 students who have been creative in using 3D shapes to construct Christmas trees. One of the most inspiring aspects of this project was the collaborative spirit displayed by the Year 9 students. They embraced the diversity of ideas within their group, demonstrating a profound respect for each other's contributions.

The 3D Christmas tree project allowed our students to explore various geometric shapes and their spatial relationships. The success of this project reflects the values we hold dear at Northfields—a commitment to creativity, collaboration, and a sense of unity that binds us

A common focus on inquiry-based learning and the real-world application of mathematical concepts helps to ease the shift. The IGCSE curriculum pushes students to investigate complex mathematical ideas and develops a stronger understanding of mathematical reasoning as they progress. This term students have studied Number and Algebra and their commitment and enthusiasm in the classroom have been very positive.

In Term 1, Year 9 Geography students delved into the fascinating world of global tourism, exploring the concept of sustainability and its impacts.


Through various activities and discussions, students gained a deeper understanding of the importance of sustainable practices in the tourism industry.


Please encourage your child to log into Accelerated Reader over the break so that they can test themselves on books that they have read. The more they read and complete quizzes the better their literacy levels will be.

For those who were unable to finish, the Personal Project (PP) coordinator will provide assistance after the Mock examination so that the students can complete their reports on time. A status update about the personal project can be found on the school report.

Encouragingly, there has been a notable increase in learning outcomes and reflections across the years for service action, reflecting heightened student engagement.

Students are now more aware of activities that qualify as service, and they are consciously participating in activities and documenting them, which is pleasing to see. We will be

assisting students in improving the quality of their reflections next term to further develop their analytical and reflective skills.

Additionally, the Year 11 cohort has completed the process of entering students for external examinations, and the statement of entries will be distributed to the students at the beginning of the next term.

Further checks will be required by the students, teachers, and parents before we finalize the entries and submit them to Cambridge International Examinations.

Nurse's Corner

WHAT IS INFLUENZA (FLU)?

This term we had a few cases of influenza at school. Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and sometimes the lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The best way to prevent flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year.

Flu Symptoms

Influenza (flu) can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. Flu symptoms usually come on suddenly. People who have flu often feel some or all these symptoms:

- Fever or feeling feverish/chills
- cough
- sore throat
- runny or stuffy nose
- muscle or body aches
- headaches
- fatigue (tiredness)
- some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.
- It's important to note that not everyone with flu will have a fever.

Preventing Seasonal Flu

The first and most important step in preventing flu is to get a flu vaccine each year. Flu vaccine has been shown to reduce flu related illnesses and the risk of serious flu complications that can result in hospitalisation or even death. Preventative measures like staying away from people who are sick, covering coughs and sneezes, and frequent handwashing help slow the spread of germs that cause respiratory (nose, throat, and lungs) illnesses, like flu. Please remain vigilant during the festive season.

SIGNS THAT YOUR FAMILY NEED A SCREEN TIME DETOX

Things to consider before doing a digital detox

- First, you're going to have to allow yourself and your family a few rough days. Detoxing from anything, let alone something that entertains you and your kiddos, will be a lot on you and your children. So make sure you have the time and energy to get everyone adjusted. Have grace for yourself and your kids as you figure out a healthier way of life.
- Secondly, decide on a time frame of how long the detox will be.
 I would suggest trying it for at least a week. But make sure it's something that's achievable for you and your family so that

- you don't find yourself giving up before you begin.
- Third, it might benefit you to start with reducing screen time instead of cutting it out completely. Then once everyone adjusts to that, have days where you go without it completely. If you work from your phone or computer, you can adjust accordingly.
- Fourth, make sure all of your family members are on board.
 Don't spring it on your kids out of nowhere. Prepare them for it.
 Talk about WHY you're doing it and the goals you have in mind.
- Lastly, have a plan for when screen time is allowed again.
 This is really important because if there's no set structure, screen time can easily become an addiction once again. So make sure there are specific guidelines that everyone agrees to follow.

Here are some benefits of doing a digital detox

- Your family will connect on a deeper level without the digital detractions
- You will find yourself reflecting more on life and your relationships
- You will be less influenced by the metaverse, allowing yourself to figure things out for yourself
